From Reverand Barbara's Desk



One of the issues that continuously confront residents of both Bennington and Rutland is the many people who are without housing in our communities. That is a challenge for towns and cities all across our country, as we all know. But the UUA is doing something about it in Boston! I'm copying a press release from earlier this month:

On March 1, 2024, the United Way announced a coordinated effort with the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA), the Black Refugee & Immigrant Community Coalition, and the Greater Boston YMCA among other community-based organizations, to provide temporary emergency housing and support to approximately 25 families with children who have an urgent and immediate need for shelter in Boston.

UUA Executive Vice President Carey McDonald said of the decision to join in this emergency effort, "In our faith tradition, Unitarian Universalists commit to uphold the inherent worthiness and dignity of every person, to embrace interconnectedness, and to strive for justice, equity and compassion in human relations. Those values are fundamental to our religious practice, and they call us to take action in the face of oppression, injustice and suffering. All children deserve a safe place to sleep. As a religious community headquartered in Boston, we consider it an act of faithful witness to use our facilities to do our part to support families in need, including migrant families who are simply seeking safety for their loved ones. We hope other building owners will take seriously whether their space can also be used in this way."

This work is carried out through the United Way & SafetyNet Shelter Grant program, which is available to families who have been determined eligible for the state's Emergency Assistance (EA) family shelter program but could not be immediately placed in an EA shelter due to a lack of availability.

This is an exciting development: it's our faith in action. We moved our headquarters into a large and efficient 24 Farnsworth building in 2013. Until recently, the top floor of that building sat empty, but now, it's providing safe housing for around 25 families! UU churches nearer to Boston are gathering supplies for those who are living there, mostly diapers, and baby supplies clothes. I don't know what we in Vermont could do to support this work, but being inspired would be a good start!

More than that, we can continue the efforts that each of our congregations makes to assist those in our own communities who are need of shelter, food, clothing, and companionship. We can't provide all of these things, but whatever we can provide is a real help, and an way of living out our faith. In Rutland, Comfort Zone, which is part of Companions in Wholeness, was the recipient of our half-plate of over \$550 in November and December, and it accepts donations of used clothing as well as food. In Bennington, our weekly involvement with Community Café offers a warm meal and a time of companionship to many, and in November our special contributions went to BROC, which provides a variety of services. There are many other options for service – and it's great to know that our denominational headquarters is actively taking part, opening their/OUR space In Boston!

So this month, kudos to the UUA, and to our congregations, both for the work that we do, and for the work that our energy, care and dues enables the UUA to undertake!
